Idaho Juvenile Human Trafficking Screening Tool Part A.

Developed in Collaboration with Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections

The purpose of the Idaho Juvenile Trafficking Screening Tool is to assist in the identification of juveniles who may be victims of sex and/or labor trafficking. This tool is broken up into two parts - Observations (Part A) and Questions (Part B). Training for this tool is available on the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections <u>webpage</u>.

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Part A: Observations Desk Aid

Part A includes a list of "observations" that may indicate that a juvenile is a victim of human trafficking or at risk of being a victim. This information will be collected through the routine social history intake process. Information may also be gathered from other sources, such as reports of trafficking from law enforcement, or through disclosures by a juvenile during the course of your work with them. Keep record of this form and the results.

The results indicated in Part A determine the next steps for further monitoring, assessment, and/or reporting. For the completion of Part A, it is important to remember:

- Do not directly ask the juvenile or family questions from the observation checklist. This is not a questionnaire.
- If you do not have enough information to complete the observations, move on to Part B.
- If the juvenile is identified as a victim of human trafficking, stop the screening and report the victimization.
- To determine if a juvenile may be a victim of sex and/or labor trafficking, check the boxes for any indicators that you note and follow the next steps located immediately following the Observations.

As mandated reporters, you are required to report suspected child abuse or neglect, including human trafficking. If a juvenile discloses having been a victim of trafficking or information provided indicates that they are or may be a victim, you must report it.

The juvenile may be a victim or is at risk if the answer is "Yes" to any of the indicators below:

Has the juvenile experienced physical or sexual abuse, or neglect?			
Does the juvenile show signs of having been denied food, water, sleep, or medical care?			
Is the juvenile unable to identify where they sleep, who holds their medication, or what they ate last?			
Does the juvenile have a history of multiple runaways or episodes of homelessness/couch surfing? (Family homelessness should not be counted)			
Is someone else other than the juvenile's parent or guardian in control of their identification or passport?			
Is the juvenile in a romantic and/or sexual relationship with a significantly older partner?			
Does the juvenile have money, a cell phone, hotel keys, or other items that they do not have the resources to obtain and cannot account for?			
Is there reason to believe there are photographs, social media posts, or other recordings of instance(s) of sexual abuse of the juvenile?			
Does the juvenile have tattoos that show, imply, or suggest ownership and/or that they do not have an explanation for?			
Has a gang affiliation been disclosed, reported, or suspected?			
Is there reason to believe that the juvenile's employment is violating labor and/or child labor laws?			
Does the juvenile appear compelled or manipulated in any way to provide labor or services (this can be "volunteer" work or services)?			
Are there signs that the juvenile is engaged in illegal activities or services for the benefit of a potential trafficker?			
Does the juvenile show evidence of a trauma bond with a possible trafficker?			
Has the parent/guardian or other family member been a victim of human trafficking or is there concern that the parent/guardian has been a victim?			
Have there been reports of suspected human trafficking by a mandated reporter or caretaker?			
Do you have any reason to believe the juvenile may be a human trafficking victim?			

Staff Response:

□ **No Known Risk Indicators**: If you answer no or unknown to all of the questions in Part A, then record "no known risk indicators". If multiple observation responses are unknown, the best course of action is to complete Part B.

□ **Risk Indicators**: If you answer yes to any of the observations above, but do not have a reason to believe at this time that the juvenile has or may have experienced trafficking, then record "at risk". This designation will ensure that staff continue to monitor the risk factors and complete Part B at a later date if additional risks or concerns lead to a reason to believe the juvenile may be a victim of trafficking.

Reason to Believe: If there is reason to believe the juvenile may be a victim of human trafficking, complete Part B.

□ **Confirmed**: If the juvenile reported exchanging a sexual act in exchange for items of value or for the monetary benefit of another person, or the juvenile reported providing labor or services under the use of force, follow the guidance in the Desk Aid.

Keep record of this form and the results.
